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News from the Virginia Chapter

Memoir Writing Presentation

At the invitation of the Fairfax County Public Library in Virginia, I gave a presentation on memoir writing on Saturday, November 5, 2022, along with my husband, Sverrir Sigurdsson. It was held at the Sherwood Regional Library in Alexandria, VA, to celebrate Indie Author Day.

I have written one and a half memoirs. The first was *Journey Across the Four Seas*, which is about my mother's life, and the second was coauthored with Sverrir about his life, titled *Viking Voyager: An Icelandic Memoir*. At the library event, Sverrir and I talked about how we turned memories into memoirs.



When my mom was in her eighties, I decided to record her stories for posterity. My mother was the one who brought the family to the U.S. and thus was the "founder" of our clan in America. Over the course of a year, we sat down together from time to time with a tape recorder. When she'd said everything she wanted to say, I transcribed the tapes. This first draft went through many revisions before it was finally printed, bound, and published.

Sverrir, too, loves to tell stories of his life, especially his travels. He usually does it over a few drinks with friends. Then someone suggested he write his memoir. He thus started jotting down memorable recollections and saving them in a folder called "Episodes" on his computer. When he showed me a chapter, I was going to humor him and encourage him to carry on – just to keep him busy during retirement. But my reaction came as a surprise. What an interesting life he had lived before we met! I'd heard about some of his trips before, but didn't realize how crazy they were until he connected the dots for me. So I rolled up my sleeves and helped him turn his memories into a memoir.

These writing experiences have taught me the necessary ingredients for cooking up a good memoir. The first one is the theme. In a memoir, the theme is the aspect of your life that you want to focus on. In *Journey*

Across the Four Seas, the theme is my mother's search for a home, and in Viking Voyager, the theme is Sverrir's Viking career. You can think of your life as a pie, and a memoir is a slice of that pie. If you want to write about your whole life, then your project is called an autobiography. It's like a scrapbook in which important pieces of a life are pasted.

Regardless of which category you take on, you should try to make the story as absorbing as a novel. In a novel, we read about a character struggling with a problem, eventually finding revelation and resolution. Descriptions of vivid scenes transport the reader to the character's world and the reader experiences what he experiences. For a memoir to be captivating, it needs all these elements of a novel. The only difference is that the characters in a memoir are real, and so are the happenings.



Sverrir and I concluded our presentation by talking about the rewards of writing memoirs. By putting down our life events on paper, we can make better sense of them. It's also a way to pass on family history to future generations. My family has certainly benefited from my mom's stories. For generations to come, members of our "clan" will know where they came from and take pride in their ancestor's struggles as well as achievements.

Chinese New Year Celebration

This year is the Year of the Water Hare, and January 22 was New Year's Day. The OCAW Virginia Chapter celebrated Chinese New Year by joining in on a Zoom webinar of the Asian American Association of the Library of Congress (LCAAA) on Wednesday, January 18, 2023, from 12 noon to 1 p.m. LCAAA invited the world-renowned speaker, Khadro Crystal Chu Rinpoche, to talk about the prediction of luck in 2023, her method of prediction, and advice for people to deal with bad situations during the year.

Combining one of the 10 Heavenly Stems and one of the 12 Earthy Branches, this year is also called the year of "Gui Mo" in the Chinese calendar, which corresponds to "Water, Wood" in the theory of the Five Elements. "As water produces wood in the generative cycle, this year is supposed to be a rather smooth year. However, given that 2022 was such an unstable year filled with uncertainties that led to negative

consequences, we are still facing a bumpy road ahead in 2023," as Khadro Rinpoche mentioned in her publication, 2023 Calendar by Yun Lin Temple.

She also mentioned that in the calendar, "the hare is agile and witty; it can easily and quickly get out of trouble. With the title on the cover page of the calendar, 'Out of Harm's Way Like a Witty Hare,' we pray for the entire world to be as clever and agile as the hare, escaping from the dangers of rising inflation and economic recession. We also pray for the peaceful ending of the war, the upholding of international justice, and the restoration of international order."




Holiday Cooking Demonstration






Fraud and Crime Prevention


What is fraud?

Fraud involves deception or misrepresentation to cheat a person out of money or property.

Common scams and how to protect yourself

Don't trust emails from people or organizations you don't know Never reply to emails or messages asking for personal information Never click on unfamiliar links in emails or text messages Don't fall for pressure tactics



What is identity theft and how to avoid identity theft

Protect yourself and avoid identity theft with the "Five Ss."

Seal your lips (Never give away personal information and avoid talking about finances in public.)
Secure personal documents in a safe place
Shred personal information
Suspect other people's motives
Scrutinize receipts

Take immediate action if you are a victim of identity theft.

- 1. Notify the business where you believe the fraud took place.
- 2. Place a fraud alert on your personal file by calling one of the three major U.S. credit report companies.
- 3. File a police report.

Antarctica 2023 - Checked off my Bucket List!



I had never even thought about going to Antarctica. All I knew was that it was very far away, and cold. But after two years of COVID caution, six months sounded far enough in the future that there was no reason not to go. Besides, my husband and I would be going with a group of friends and my commitment of a cruise to Antarctica was in January of 2023 and that was six months off!

Before I knew it, it was December and well past the time when we could get our deposit back. So we were committed to having the trip of a lifetime. Luckily, we had a great travel agent who made our travel arrangements. We went from Houston to Miami, caught a red-eye, and slept our way in business class to Santiago, Chile. One night at the Mandarin Oriental, then a three-hour flight to Puerto Williams where we boarded The Silver Cloud Cruise Ship and sailed through the Drake Passage for two days! Luckily, we were able to spend those two sailing days listening to lectures, socializing with our friends, and eating. Lots of eating!

The Ship's four restaurants offered totally different menus and ambiance. But over the course of the Cruise, the most interesting thing was observing the different people. Our group of twenty was loud and full of laughter. But there were others that sat quietly and never spoke. Because I had just read an article in the *Wall Street Journal* about how important social relationships were to happiness, even more important than exercise or diet, I was even more grateful for having the opportunity to share and strengthen my friendships.



Antarctica is the most pristine place on the planet. And to really appreciate it, you need to get into zodiacs, pontoon-like boats, and go ashore to see the penguins, and kayak to see the icebergs, whales, and sea birds. Of course, if you are adventurous, you can do a Polar Plunge and jump into the frigid waters – and that is a real wakeup call to reengage with life!
