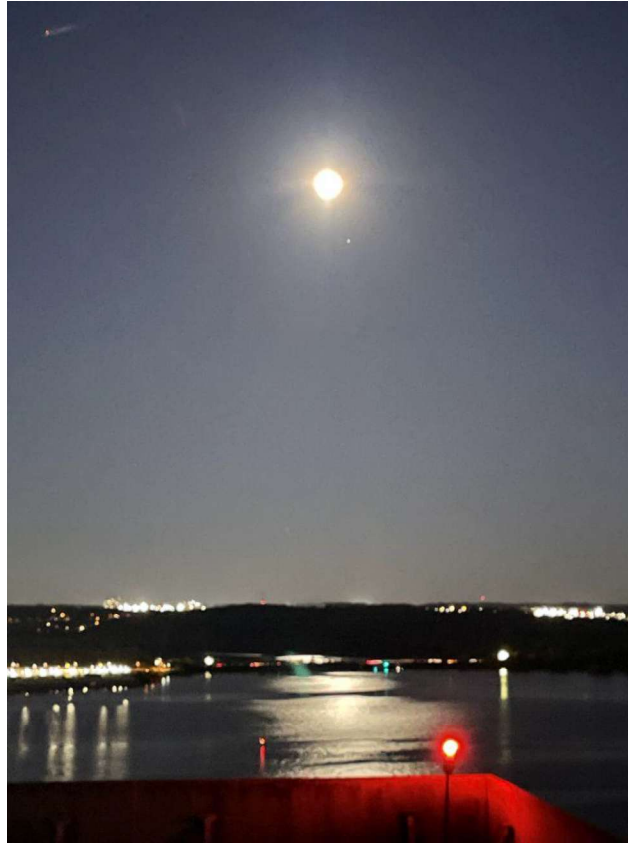
News from the Virginia Chapter

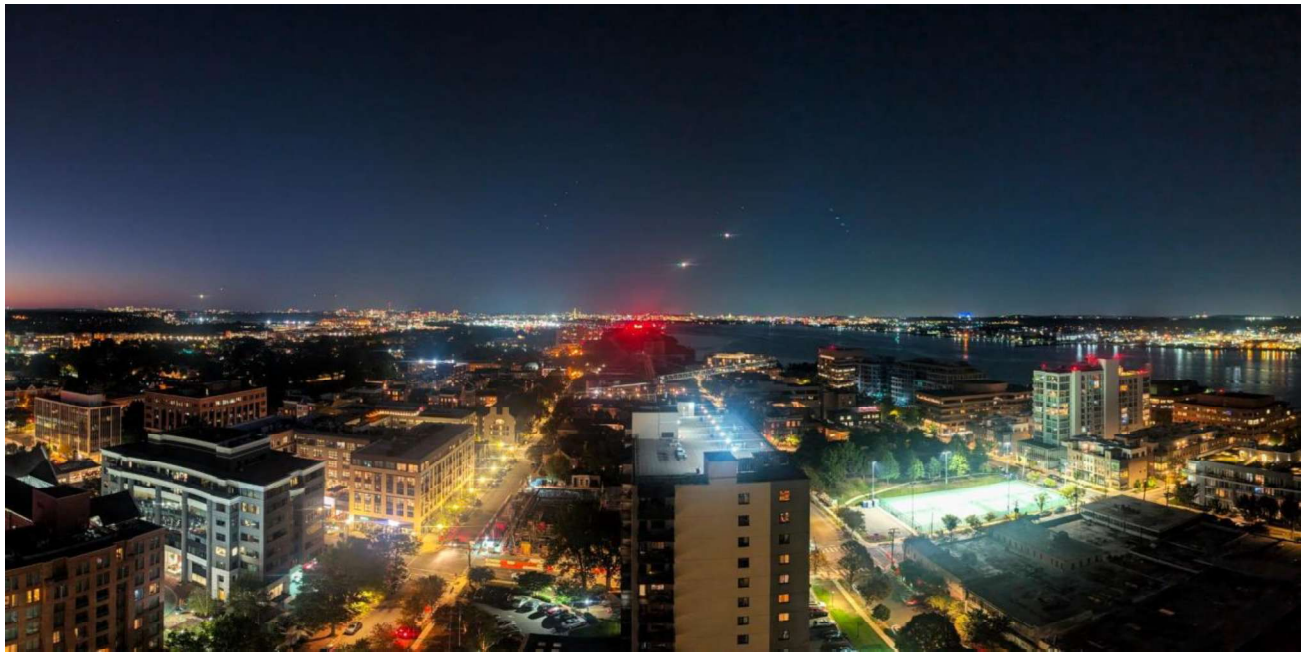
Mid-Autumn Festival Potluck Dinner

Chrysanthemums in Bloom: From Falls Church to Chengdu and Taipei

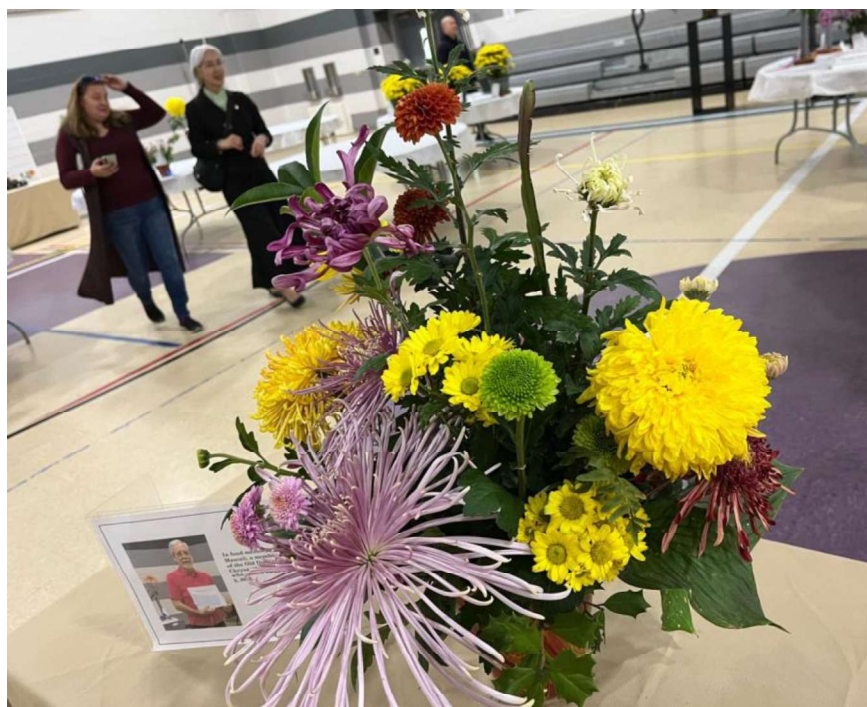

As the crisp air of autumn sweeps in, chrysanthemums begin to bloom – bright and full, yet graceful and calm. Known as the “flowers of autumn,” they carry with them the spirit of endurance and the quiet beauty of change. On Saturday, October 25, 2025, I attended the 50th **Chrysanthemum Show in Falls Church, Virginia**, presented by the Old Dominion Chrysanthemum Society. Our longtime OCAW member and former President of OCAW Maryland, Camilla Ng, serves on the Society’s Board. Once again, the show brought the magic to life, connecting not just local flower lovers, but also traditions that stretch across oceans – to **Chengdu, China**, and **Taipei, Taiwan**.

Autumn Splendor in Falls Church

At the Falls Church Chrysanthemum Show, the exhibition room was filled with bursts of color – sunny yellows, royal purples, soft pinks, and pure whites. Each bloom seemed to tell its own story. Visitors wandered among the displays, admiring arrangements shaped like waterfalls, lanterns, and even dragons made entirely of petals. What made the event even more special was its cultural spirit. Alongside the flowers, conversations flowed effortlessly, bridging generations and cultures. For many, it felt like more than a flower show; it was a joyful gathering that celebrated beauty, friendship, heritage, and memory.

I met some people who are from China and Taiwan. One of them was born in Chengdu, China. She recalled that schoolchildren there had a field trip to People’s Park to attend the Chrysanthemum show every year. We shared the experiences of attending the Chrysanthemum Shows in Taipei and Chengdu and treasured the memories.

Chengdu: A City That Blossoms Year-Round

Thousands of miles away, in Chengdu, the capital of Sichuan Province, chrysanthemums also take center stage each autumn. Known as the “City of Flowers,” Chengdu has been nurturing chrysanthemums for over a thousand years. During the annual **Chrysanthemum Festival**, local parks transform into vibrant seas of blooms.

Chengdu's residents have a deep affection for the chrysanthemum. In Chinese culture, it symbolizes integrity and perseverance – blooming brightly even as the weather cools. Chinese poets like Tao Yuanming once wrote of retreating to the countryside to admire chrysanthemums, finding peace in their simple strength. That same sentiment still lingers in Chengdu today, where visitors can stroll through parks filled with the scent of flowers and the echoes of history.

Taipei: Where Tradition Meets Art

In Taipei, Taiwan's lively and modern capital, the chrysanthemum continues to inspire both artists and gardeners. Every fall, the Taipei Chrysanthemum Exhibition at the Shilin Official Residence transforms the grounds into a dreamlike landscape. Thousands of chrysanthemums, carefully cultivated and artistically arranged, fill the gardens with color and fragrance.

The show reflects Taipei's creative spirit; traditional flower art mingles with contemporary design. Visitors might find chrysanthemums arranged as intricate sculptures, or displayed in peaceful Zen-style gardens. For many families, attending the exhibition is an annual tradition, a moment to slow down and appreciate nature's quiet beauty amid the city's energy.

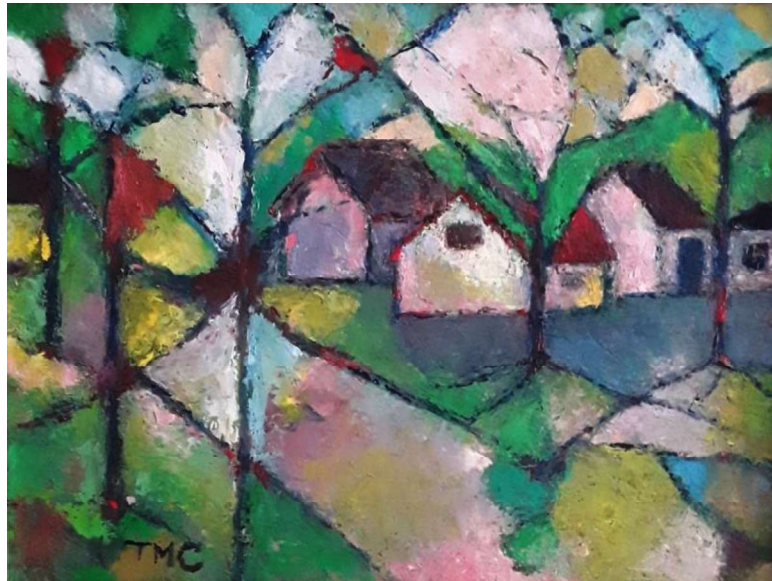
A Shared Language of Flowers

Bridging Cultures Through Art: A Celebration of Chinese and American Heritage at the National Presbyterian Assembly Dinner

(Editor’s Note: A National Presbyterian Church conference was held at the Sheraton Hotel in downtown New Orleans. Conferees had the option of attending this performing arts celebration as an opening dinner reception, and many took advantage and enjoyed the evening.)

On the evening of Tuesday, September 23, 2025, at the Chinese Presbyterian Church in Kenner, Louisiana, the National Presbyterian Assembly was graced with a vibrant display of cross-cultural artistry during a dinner program that brought together the Feiyang Dance Team and the New Orleans Skylark Performance Troupe, both of which include many members of the OCAW New Orleans Chapter. Held in the spirit of unity and mutual appreciation, the evening's performances highlighted the richness of Chinese cultural traditions while celebrating shared spiritual values through music and movement.

A Lively Opening: *Who Wouldn't Praise My Hometown*

The program began with a jubilant dance entitled *Who Wouldn't Praise My Hometown*, presented by the Feiyang Dance Team. Choreographed and directed by Linda Lin and Lin Yuan, the piece drew from the traditional Jiaozhou Yangko folk dance style. Known for its colorful costumes, rhythmic flair, and joyful energy, Jiaozhou Yangko is a festive expression of community life in northern China. The dancers skillfully conveyed pride in one's roots and the joy found in everyday moments, offering a heartfelt invitation to the audience to share in this sense of belonging.

Musical Serenity: *Moonlight in the Lotus Pond*

This was followed by a Xiao solo, *Moonlight in the Lotus Pond*, performed with grace and sensitivity by Cuilan Li. The Xiao – a vertical bamboo flute traditionally used in classical Chinese music – lent a soft, meditative voice to the tranquil imagery of moonlight shimmering across a lotus pond. Li's performance evoked a quiet evening scene, filled with the gentle stir of nature, and drew listeners into a contemplative space.



Elegance and Imagery: *Ink and Cloud Hats*

The Skylark Performance Troupe then presented *Ink and Cloud Hats*, a choreographed qipao showcase directed by Lily Yang. The piece was inspired by the mist-shrouded landscape of Chongqing, known as China's mountain city. The performers, adorned in traditional qipao dresses and bamboo hats, moved as if drifting through time and water. Their choreography referenced ancient poetic imagery and the romantic spirit of wandering heroes, metaphorically gliding "like a light boat passing through ten thousand mountains."

Youthful Talent: *The Ripples in the Milky Way*

A standout moment of the evening was a Guzheng solo by Mason Wu, a 9th grade student at Hynes Academy of Advanced Study School, who performed *The Ripples in the Milky Way*. This modern composition was inspired by the myth of the Qixi Festival – the annual reunion of star-crossed lovers on the Magpie Bridge. Combining Hunan folk elements with flowing, lyrical phrasing, Wu’s performance painted a vivid soundscape in four movements: the lovers’ meeting, the flowing waters beneath, a joyful celebration, and a gentle return to the beginning theme. His poise and expressive touch on the Guzheng captured the imagination of the audience.



A Shared Benediction: *This Is My Father's World*

Concluding the evening was a choral performance of *This Is My Father's World*, sung in Chinese by the Skylark Women's Choir, under the direction of Lily Yang. This beloved hymn, penned by Presbyterian pastor Maltbie Davenport Babcock, served as a poignant reminder of the spiritual foundation that unites the assembly. The audience was invited to join in singing the third verse in English, reinforcing the evening's theme of shared faith and collective celebration.

She is outstanding not only in academic achievement, but also in community involvement, and has two passions in robotics and music. Michelle became interested in robotics when she was in middle school, joined the robotics team in high school, and was elected as vice president for the

upcoming robotics season. She has been playing violin and piano since elementary school, and has won awards in various music competitions. Michelle participated in several volunteer jobs such as music tutor and summer camp youth teacher, and she also raised money for a nonprofit music organization. She is well qualified for the YAA award, and we wish her success in the future.

Michelle was not feeling well so could not attend the event, but she sent the following letter which was read by Cynthia Chang.

Hello, everyone! My name is Michelle Xie, the recipient of the OCAW Youth Achievement Award.

First of all, I want to thank Pin Laoshi for telling me about this opportunity. Without your encouragement and guidance, I would not have had the chance to learn about or even apply for this award. Thank you for all your support!

Second, I'm truly honored to receive the OCAW-SVC *Youth Achievement Award*. This award means a lot to me, and celebrates the values of leadership, service, and community that I hope to carry with me into the future.

My journey began with robotics. After seeing a robot perform basketball tricks at my middle school, I became very interested in robotics and electrical engineering. Since joining my high school's robotics team,

I've served as electrical lead, secretary, and now vice president. I've helped our team win the Engineering Innovation Award, place as finalists at the Idaho Regional, and qualify for the World Championships two years in a row.

But to me, the most rewarding part of robotics is not the awards. Rather, it's the people I make an impact on. I've taught weekly electrical training, run Arduino and FIRST Lego League camps, and organized *Noche de Ciencias*, which brought Hispanic engineers to inspire local students and give them hands-on STEM experience. I was also invited as a speaker for the WiSTEM "Be the Change" Forum for the Society of Women Engineers (San Diego Chapter) to advocate for diversity and gender inclusivity within engineering. Through these events, I've learned that innovation is richest when it comes from a diversity of voices.

Outside robotics, I also enjoy playing music. I play violin and piano, and had the opportunity to perform with the California Youth Symphony and Stanford Summer Symphony, and play in international competitions with my string quartet. However, I also hope to use my talents to give back to my community. I organize concerts at senior homes, raise funds for young musicians, and co-founded the Prospect Music Education Club (PMEC) to make music learning more accessible.

Throughout my experience, both robotics and music helped me learn that we should always make use of our abilities to help out the people around us.

Thank you to OCAW-SVC for recognizing young leaders and showing how heritage, excellence, and service can come together. And thank you to my mentors, teammates, teachers, friends, and my family for supporting me. Thank you, everyone!

4. Carol's presentation *(written by Carol Yuan)*



Carol gave a brief introduction of the national Master Gardener program and the UC Master Gardeners of Santa Clara County program where she received her training and certificate. The UC Master Gardeners Program of Santa Clara County is a volunteer organization sponsored by the [University of California Cooperative Extension](#). The mission is *to extend research-based knowledge and information on home horticulture, pest management, and sustainable landscape practices to county residents*. Their services include Help Desk, Monthly email letter, Demonstration gardens, School gardens support, and Events and Classes.

Her presentation also lightly touched on the content of the 18-week-long course, her final project, and the volunteer opportunities available once one is certified as a UC Master Gardener of Santa Clara County.

Silicon Valley Walk to End Alzheimer's

This is the 11th year that the OCAW Silicon Valley Chapter has participated in the “Silicon Valley Walk to End Alzheimer’s” to raise awareness and funds to fight Alzheimer’s disease. The goal of the Silicon Valley Walk is to raise \$2.4M this year. Nearly \$2M has been raised so far. The event is organized by the Alzheimer’s Association. The Association is the leading voluntary health organization in Alzheimer’s care, support, and research. Its mission is to eliminate Alzheimer’s disease through the advancement of research; to provide and enhance care and support for all affected; and to reduce the risk of dementia through the promotion of brain health.

I’ve been very happy to be the team captain for the 11th year. Our team name is OCAW-SVC Friends and Families. We have 19 team members and donors this year and raised \$3,760 so far. In supporting and recognizing SVC’s decade-long efforts in fighting to end Alzheimer’s disease, OCAW headquarters and Opera International, along with a recognition letter, generously donated \$1,000 to our team this year! We are deeply grateful for the recognition. Their support truly inspires us to keep going.

This year’s walk was on Saturday, October 11, and again it was at Lake Cunningham Park in San Jose, CA. Nearly 2400 walkers took part walking either a one-mile or three-mile route around the park. Our Treasurer and former president Sophia Yang invited her sister Sunny Yang, her friend Debbie Lu, and Debbie’s husband Mr. Cai to join the walk. About the **meeting's venue**:

A Glimpse into Hawaii's Chinese History through the Palolo Chinese Home

The OCAW Hawaii Chapter held its August 2025 General Membership Meeting at a senior care facility, the Palolo Chinese Home (PCH). While it may sound surprising, it made perfect sense to go there. The Hawaii Chapter has several strong and loyal connections to PCH, originally established in 1896 for elderly Chinese men of Hawaii.

In the mid-19th century, many Chinese men were contracted to work on the sugar plantations of Hawaii. They came mostly from the Guangdong Province of China, when Hawaii was still a kingdom. Many of these contract laborers stayed to make the Hawaiian Islands their home, seeking better economic opportunities and freedom from the Ching Dynasty. But some finished their contracts and found themselves destitute. The situation became even more critical when the United States made Hawaii a Territory in 1898, as the Chinese Exclusion Act affected the ability to bring family from China.

There was an increase in the aging Chinese male population with no family support and some with limited or no means of income. (Think: no retirement benefits, and Social Security did not start until the 1930s.) Meanwhile, a group of 326 local Chinese community leaders were moved by their tradition of filial piety, and

they donated funds and had converted an old Chinese hospital in Palolo Valley on the island of Oahu into a home for these men. It was first called the “Palolo Home” or “Palolo Chinese Old Men Home.” Gradually, that communal home became ‘assisted-living’ and then a ‘care home.’

In 1918, a Portuguese “paniolo” (cowboy) who fell off his horse and sustained long-term injuries, became the first non-Chinese resident to be admitted there. In 1972, Mrs. Hiram Fong, the late Hawaii U.S. Senator’s wife, led the drive to build a structure to house women on the property. Palolo Home opened its doors to elders without racial or gender discrimination. The present name, Palolo Chinese Home, was officially chosen to recognize its beginnings.

One of OCAW Hawaii Chapter’s staunch members, Carolyn Yap Ballou, served as the first female Palolo Chinese Home Administrator for 17 years. Carolyn passed away after a battle with cancer in 2019.



Several of our OCAW ladies have served or still are serving on the PCH Board; some of you may have met or remember Phyllis Shea, Gladys Lee, or Frances Goo. Frances is currently a PCH Corporate Director and continues to be an active OCAW member.

Today, OCAW Hawaii Chapter past president, and new OCAW National Secretary, Edwina Lee, has a daughter-in-law who works on staff at the Palolo Chinese Home. Thus the idea of holding a meeting and luncheon at the Home popped up. The Home has a lovely social hall that has started to cater events. This is a good source of additional revenue to support PCH in their care of the aging, not only on location, but with outreach services to the community!

On Sunday, August 24, 2025, OCAW Hawaii Chapter Members present at the General Membership Meeting held at the Palolo Chinese Home, unanimously approved a donation of \$500 to the Mun Lun School for their music and dance programs to honor the memory of our late OCAW longtime member, Muriel “Mimi” Lee Hom.

Mun Lun School in Honolulu, Hawaii, is the oldest, largest, and continuous daily Chinese language school in the United States, founded in 1911. The curriculum encompasses both Chinese reading and writing with Chinese culture in the arts and traditions. From the very beginning, girls were included in their student body, which was uncommon in the early 20th century. Focusing on the basic Confucian virtues of Filial Piety, Diligence, Honesty, Patriotism, and Fellowship, the school imparts these virtues on their students who transition these to be good American citizens, as well as upstanding individuals.

We recognize Mimi’s lifelong devotion to promoting great music and opera and how she raised substantial funds to support and encourage these endeavors among the Chinese American community over the many years. With her family’s encouragement to pass it forward, our Chapter has done just that on our modest level.

Hawaii Chapter President Sharlene Chun has chosen to present the donation at the annual Mun Lun School Alumni Banquet which will be held after this newsletter has been published. We will be sure to have a photo of the occasion to share with the OCAW Chapters in the next issue.

The Republic of China's 114th Anniversary Celebration, and History

My husband Bill and I were honored to be invited by the Education Division of the Taipei Economic and Cultural Representative Office (TECRO) in the United States to attend the celebration of the Republic of China's 114th anniversary at Twin Oaks, Washington, D.C., on Wednesday, October 8, 2025.

The hosts of the celebration were Ambassador Alexander Yui and Madam Yui. The event was attended by many distinguished guests, including several U.S. Congressmen and former Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi, who joined in honoring the Republic of China's National Day, known as the Double Tenth Day, celebrated on October 10.

The Republic of China (ROC) was established in 1912 following the fall of the Qing Dynasty, marking the end of over two thousand years of imperial rule. After years of internal conflict and civil war between the Nationalists and Communists, the ROC government relocated to Taiwan in 1949 when the People's Republic of China (PRC) was founded on the mainland. Under Chiang Kai-shek, Taiwan remained under one-party rule until the late 1980s, when political reforms ushered in democracy and direct presidential elections.

Today, the ROC continues to govern Taiwan as a vibrant and democratic society, even though most countries officially recognize the PRC as the government of China. The ROC governed mainland China from 1912 to 1949 (37 years) and has remained in Taiwan since 1949, while the PRC has ruled mainland China for 76 years.



The PRC Government has never governed Taiwan. The Japanese government colonized Taiwan for 50 years (1895-1945), and the ROC government has ruled Taiwan from 1945 to the present (80 years).

This year marks the 114th anniversary of the Republic of China – a milestone proudly celebrated by the people of Taiwan.

Here is a short history of the Republic of China (ROC) after 1912:

- **1912** – The Republic of China (ROC) was founded after the fall of the Qing Dynasty. Sun Yat-sen became the provisional president, marking the end of over two thousand years of imperial rule.
- **1912–1927** – China entered a period of **political fragmentation** and **warlordism**. The central government was weak, and regional military leaders held power in various parts of the country.
- **1927–1949** – The **Chinese Civil War** began between the **Nationalists (Kuomintang, KMT)** led by Chiang Kai-shek and the **Communists (CPC)** led by Mao Zedong. During this period, the ROC also fought the **Second Sino-Japanese War (1937–1945)**, part of World War II.
- **1945** – After Japan's defeat, Taiwan was returned to Chinese administration under the ROC.
- **1949** – The Communists won the civil war and established the **People's Republic of China (PRC)** on the mainland. The ROC government **retreated to Taiwan**, keeping control of Taiwan, Penghu, Jinmen, and Matsu islands.
- **1950s–1970s** – Under Chiang Kai-shek, the ROC maintained martial law and claimed to be the legitimate government of all China. The ROC held China's seat at the United Nations until **1971**, when it was transferred to the PRC.
- **1980s–1990s** – Taiwan began **political and economic liberalization**. Martial law ended in **1987**, and the first direct presidential election was held in **1996**.

- **2000–present** – Taiwan has become a **democratic society** with regular elections and peaceful transfers of power. The ROC continues to exist in Taiwan, though its international recognition is limited, with most countries recognizing the PRC instead.

(Mimi peacefully passed away on July 22, 2025 at age 98. Among several other positions, she was Founder and Director of Opera International, and OCAW National Vice President for Programs for 30 years.)

Planning and executing a memorial service/Celebration of Life for Mimi Hom was a labor of love by her family and close friends. As Mimi had advanced in years and the subject of her future memorial service had come up, she told her children that she did not have any preferences as to what Bible readings or other items were selected. However, she cared **only** about the music (not surprising!), and she was extremely specific about which pieces were to be performed, and by whom, and in what order! So we received our marching orders from her, and dared not deviate from them! 😊

With the music set, her son Steven Hom suggested a minister, close friend Hongfa Chu suggested a pianist, and daughter Linda Devine suggested a Remembrances speaker. Daughter and OCAW-MD lifetime member Janet Biermann and Linda then met with the chaplain at the venue for the service. From then on, Janet masterfully organized the Celebration of Life, coordinated the participants, and tended to all of the details.

Sunday, September 28, 2025, could not have been a sunnier, lovelier day, to serve as a backdrop for the service. That afternoon, many gathered to pay their respects to Mimi at the Chapel of The Village at Rockville, in Rockville, Maryland.

The venue was packed, with additional folding chairs eventually needed – a testament to the love and respect that so many people had for Mimi. In addition to family members, friends, and neighbors, numerous OCAW members were in attendance, as well as members of the Chinese Community Church in Washington, D.C., and the Hermon Presbyterian Church in Bethesda, MD. Opera International and the Maryland State Music Teachers Association were also represented. Furthermore, many from different parts of the country tuned in to participate online, although unfortunately The Village’s wi-fi was problematic at that time, with only some people able to have some reception.

Frank Conlon, a wonderful pianist and longtime fixture on the Washington music scene, played lovely music as attendees gathered. Rev. Dr. Michael Koppel from Hermon Presbyterian Church presided over the service, and welcomed guests. Janet Biermann then presented a scripture reading.

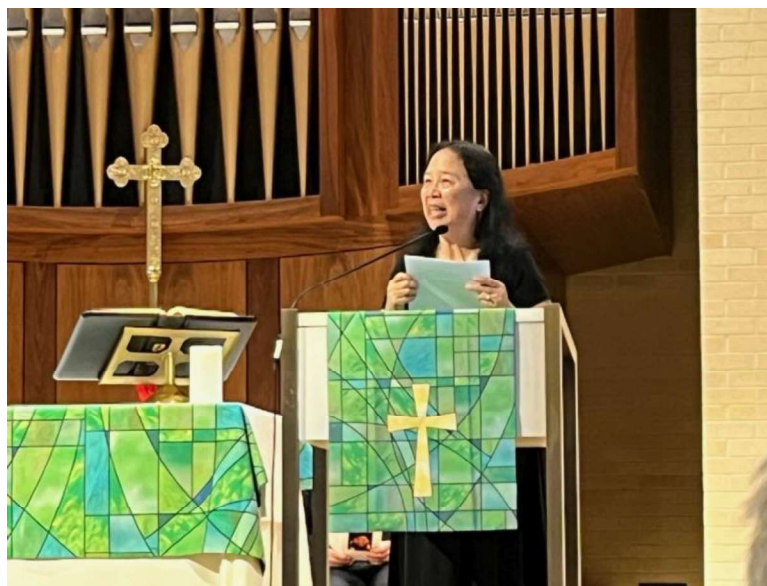

The *Evening Prayer*, sung by Maria and Emily Chu, is from the German opera, *Hansel and Gretel*.

Attribution: “*Evening Prayer* in the second act of Engelbert Humperdinck’s opera, *Hänsel und Gretel*, composed in 1892 and first performed on December 23, 1893...is a treasure that will live forever in the hearts of countless listeners. Called *Abendsegen* in its original German and *Evening Prayer* in English, it is also known as *The Children’s Prayer*. In the opera, it is what Hansel and Gretel sing before they go to sleep, alone and lost in the woods.”
